or have injured ourselves. They give us a physical examination once a year. If anyone is injured at any time, he is sent or taken over to see Dr. McGinn.

We have safety rules to help us in many things. Mr. Van Ness asks us to use common sense in cases where there are no rules. We have a Safety Patrol to help us remember.

Twice a month we have a fire drill so that we will not get excited if there is a real fire and will be able to leave the building quickly. Each class has a special stairway and door to use. Sometimes we practice having one stairway blocked off as it might be in case of a real fire. As soon as the fire alarm rings, we are to get out of doors as quickly as possible but we must not talk or push or run. Mr. Van Ness times us to see how long it takes to clear the building. It is usually about one minute.

## THE IVY

The ivy which covers the front of the school came from Trinity College, Oxford University, England. It was the college of Samuel Pope. The ivy was presented to the school by a former pupil. It was planted in June, 1893. A small metal plate on the left of the main entrance tells about this.

## SCHOOL ONE IN THE WORLD WAR

During the first World War in 1917, the girls from the seventh and eighth grade knitted for the soldiers in the war. The smaller children knitted wash rags.
