Mrs. T. Barrett, Mrs. F. Westcott, Mrs. William DeBree and Mrs. Paul Tużo. The purpose of the P.T.A. was the same as it is today. It was organized so that the teachers and parents might meet and better understand each other and be able to help the children.

This year there were 249 members who belonged to our P.T.A. One regular meeting was held each month. At each meeting there was an interesting program. Some of the programs were based on music, plays, speakers and motion pictures. After the program, there was always a time for our parents and teachers to talk.

To encourage attendance, one dollar is given each month to the class having the largest percentage of attendance on the part of parents. Two dollars are given to the class which has the most parents belonging to the P.T.A. Miss Maranville's class won this year.

The P.T.A. has helped our school in many other ways. The association gave our school a stage curtain, has provided dental care, operations and glasses for several of our school children this year.

OUR SCHOOL SONG

Our school song was written in 1935 by the Sixth Grades under Miss Maranville's direction. It is sung to the tune of "Believe Me If All Thos Endearing Young Charms" by Thomas Moore. The second verse is sung by the sixth grades only at the last assembly of the year.
