

The firehouse had withstood considerable use until then. On May 16, 1922, the membership voted unanimously for the reconstruction of the building, the cost was not to exceed \$4,000.

The first motorized fire engine arrived on December 18, 1923. This was a Reo Speed Wagon, purchased from the Buffalo Fire Appliance Corporation at a cost of \$4,469.00. It was designated Engine 1 and served the borough until 1947. After much discussion between the membership and the borough council it was decided that the six members of the Fire Company who were licensed drivers be instructed in the operation of the engine. These members were placed in charge of the apparatus and alternated the duties among themselves. On December 25, 1923, the engine was used for the first time at a fire at the home




Fanwood's REO Speed Wagon was used in the Memorial Day Parade when not in service fighting frequent house fires.
