



The fire at the Hulbert Beardsley home on January 30, 1936, was considered the most stubborn blaze the firefighters had ever encountered. They were on the scene from 5:30 to 11:30 P.M. with the engine pumping for four hours. The roof was covered with asphalt shingles, and the fire followed along the beams, breaking out at various places. The roof and upper portion of the big house were badly damaged by the fire with the lower floor sustaining severe water damage. It was reported that sparks from the chimney were the cause of the fire. The chief was frozen into his coat after being drenched with water; unable to free himself from the coat firemen had to cut the buttons off his jacket to remove it.
