<b>BLACK BIRCH ROAD</b> *11	Mr. and Mrs. William P. Elliott, known as the Frazee-Lee House, (see tour p. 6) (46)
<b>BUTTONWOOD LANE</b> 2160	Charles F. Buechler, "The Family Lott of the DeCamps," (see tour p. 4) (42)
<b>CLARK'S LANE</b>	Charles H. Detwiller, Jr.; pre-Revolutionary milk house foundation of present Guest House, orig. Thomas Terry's in 1766, father of Phebe Terry Littell, later Charles Clark's. (48)
<b>CUSHING ROAD</b> 1280	Robert A. Burner, early American, W. Phillips in 1862. (48)
<b>ELM COURT</b> *215	John D. Carter, part of Baker Homestead in 1800, J. B. Clark's in 1862, later Ackerman farm house, Sheelan's in 1900. (15)
<b>FRONT STREET</b> *1538	Fred E. Coles, built in 1742 by Marster William Cole, teacher, surveyor; son Frazee Cole, auctioneer; an antique shop in 1900s, owned by direct descendant. (1)
*1800	Charlotte Realty Corp., older section built in 1750s by Aaron Parse, William F. Piatt's in early 1800s, then sister's: Jemina and Elijah Shotwell, Quaker preacher; granddaughter Caroline S. and Charles Newell Flanders' in 1868. (6)
1818	Marion L. Clark, Jotham Frazee's in 1819, Ezekiel Clark's in 1853, George Stilger's Cobbler Shop in 1880s, present owner a descendant of Abraham Clark, N. J. Rep. signing Declaration of Independence. (6)
*1828	Mrs. August D. Ahrens, built in pre-Revolutionary period, (see tour, p. 9) (6)
*1840	Mrs. Louise Snook, "Osborne's Cannonball House," ball from cannon stuck in side of house during Revolution, was house of Hollingsworth's of Darby Fur Mill. (6)
*cor. of Park Avenue	Stage House Village and Inn, (see tour p. 10) (3)
<b>GRAND STREET</b> cor. of Union Avenue	Y.M.C.A. built in 1817 as second Baptist Church, was on Park Ave., moved in 1871, was a four room school house in 1889, bowling alley, gym added in 1911 for community house. (8)
<b>JERUSALEM ROAD</b> * (near Plainfield Avenue)	Scotch Hills Country Club, orig. John Locey farm house between 1740-1800, R. R. Johnston in 1862, sold to George B. Osborn in 1882, was Shady Rest Country Club in 1960s. (26)
<b>LAKE AVENUE</b> *1800 (cor. Raritan Road)	Elliott E. Moore, "Littell Homestead," 1720 home of Benjamin, grandson John's in 1824, Isaac's in 1839. Paul Novak's restaurant in 1935. (44)
<b>MARTINE AVENUE</b> 1285	William Meyerhoff, "Scudder Home" William Scudder bought in 1823 for bride Mary Hetfield, second half pre-Civil War, son Daniel, 1852-1888, son George until 1941, twin sisters Margaret and Anna sold in 1945. (34)
1461	Howard P. Snyder, Levi Frazee's in 1791, became Aaron Darby's in 1829, in 1862 was Levi Darby's, then son John Darby. (39)
<b>MOUNTAIN AVENUE</b> *2104	John F. Matusick, pioneer James Coles' in early 1700, son was Freeholder Dennis Coles; grandson, Dr. J. Ackerman Coles. House had a kitchen well, was owned by the Stout family in 1860-90s. (13)
2511	William McBride, house built in 1800 by Jonathan I. Baker for son Jesse Clark Baker, at one time a Stanbery farm; 1862 J. Scott home; in 1870s part of Ackerman estate when their coachman Walker lived here. (21)
<b>PARK AVENUE</b> 245	Snuffy Jr's, house behind built in 1800 by Col. Recompense Stanbery, was son Williams' in 1880s. Stood on cor. Park and Mountain, but moved North in 1905. (9)
*314-18	Edith Elliot, early American home part of Lyon Farm, James C. Lyon sold to Maxwell Frazee in 1850, George Randolph, 1869; from 1899 owned by Benjamin G. Elliott. (3)
328	C. B. & J. S. Thatcher, was M. S. Dunn's—hero of 1886 flood; Frank Hosinger's. (3)
*334	Future site of Scotch Plains Bank, house known as Uncle Jimmy Lyon's, built before 1737, may be home of Joseph Lyon, here in 1712. (3)
347	Old Baptist Parsonage, (see tour p. 2) (8)
*348	Dr. Paul Lewinter, built 1737, later home of Cooper Parse, Judge of Superior Court of N. J., then his son's Manning Parse. (3)
