Howard S. Woods, known as Henry Clay Randolph's. (48)

Arthur E. Smith, Jonathan Terry's during Revolution. (see tour p. 8) (48)

Elmer L. and Mary Somlock Terry. (see tour p. 8) (48)

Felice F. Carri, earl yfarm of E. Ryno, at juncture of roads, "County Stone," *Middlesex* on one side, *Essex* on other. (50)

Joseph Amberg, Jr., orig. Dog Farm of Ephraim Ryno, was Alton stage stop, later Mellick's store. (50)

Harry A. Edwards, under peach tree orchid is an Indian burial ground, some 25 pioneers buried there. (50)

S. Salamon, moved from across street by John Darby, was home of Mathew Connet in 1727, purchased by Sam Lee, left to Frazee Lee in 1857. Bought by J. Leslie Lambert in 1907. To be removed. (49)

J. Kaminski, J. Zegray duplex, the Two Bridges School House built in 1816, (50)

Maxwell S. Simpson, Hetfield's coach-house, now artist's studio. (49)

Edward S. Kucinski, "13 Stars" under eaves of home, was Sea Captain Brown's in early 1700s, bought by Daniel Hetfield in 1855. (49)

Franklyn T. Terry, Gershom Frazee I and wife, Aunt Betsy, (see tour p. 7) (49)

Josephine DiMiceli, Littell property during Rev., bought by Gershom Littell for bride Phebe Terry in 1785, known as "Half-way Well," in 1860s. Anna Littell, school teacher, home until 1941. (46)

Novak's Restaurant, before 1775 was Anthony Littell, H. Hetfield's in 1862. (45)

A. K. Burr, back section built 1730s by John Lambert 2nd, son James, died in Sugar House prison during Revolution, grandson Simeon built new addition in 1846-7, bought by Gulian Lansing in 1929, home of George E. Johnston, ex-mayor, 1956-63. Recent modernization by Robert Newman, Inc. (42)

G. D. Joblon, 1840 grist mill. (see tour p. 5) (42)

Robert L. Kaiser, Freelove DeCamp's and David Dunham. (see tour p. 5) (42)

Clinton D. Seaman, known as John DeCamp's, built in 1735, (see tour p. 4) (42)

G. and S. Brown, first school of Baptist church built in 1768, moved from Park Ave. Village Green, in early 1900s. (8)

Lamar Tuzo, built in 1790s, federal period, home of clipper ship Capt. Benjamin Tuzo, son an international architect, grandson present owner. (47)

Curtis G. Eves, orig. Jesse Dolbier home from 1740-1800. (48)

Jack Clawson, early American homestead of John Cook. (13)

Francis C. Yoerg, 1770 Amos Swan's, 1870s Coles' gardener Mr. Yoerg. (14)

James D. Miller, early home of John Bornmann. (17)

Robert L. Cochran. (see tour p. 3) (29)
