The stereo-image caption reads: "These mills are charmingly situated centred of the gorge, a site both wild and romantic. Long known as the Fall Mill—a grist mill having been established here 120 years ago." The description of Scotch Plains from the stereo-image caption is written to entice potential residents: "Scotch Plains, New Jersey is pleasantly situated at the foot of the first mountain, two miles east of Plainfield. It derived its name from Scotch immigrants in 1684. The soil is fertile; a nearly level plain, bounded by the mountains on the north, while hills of gentle undulating lines rise to the south. Nature has been munificent in charming scenery. Green Brook, a sylvan stream of no slight importance, breaks through a delightful gorge, leaping rocky barriers in silvery cascades, forming miniature lakes, mirroring the great rocks and vernal green of the mountain in entrancing beauty. There are also private parks, where art has assisted nature, combining in harmonious effects beauties rarely excelled. Scotch Plains has three churches, a comfortable public school building, paper and fur mills, and a number of stores, hotel, &c."
