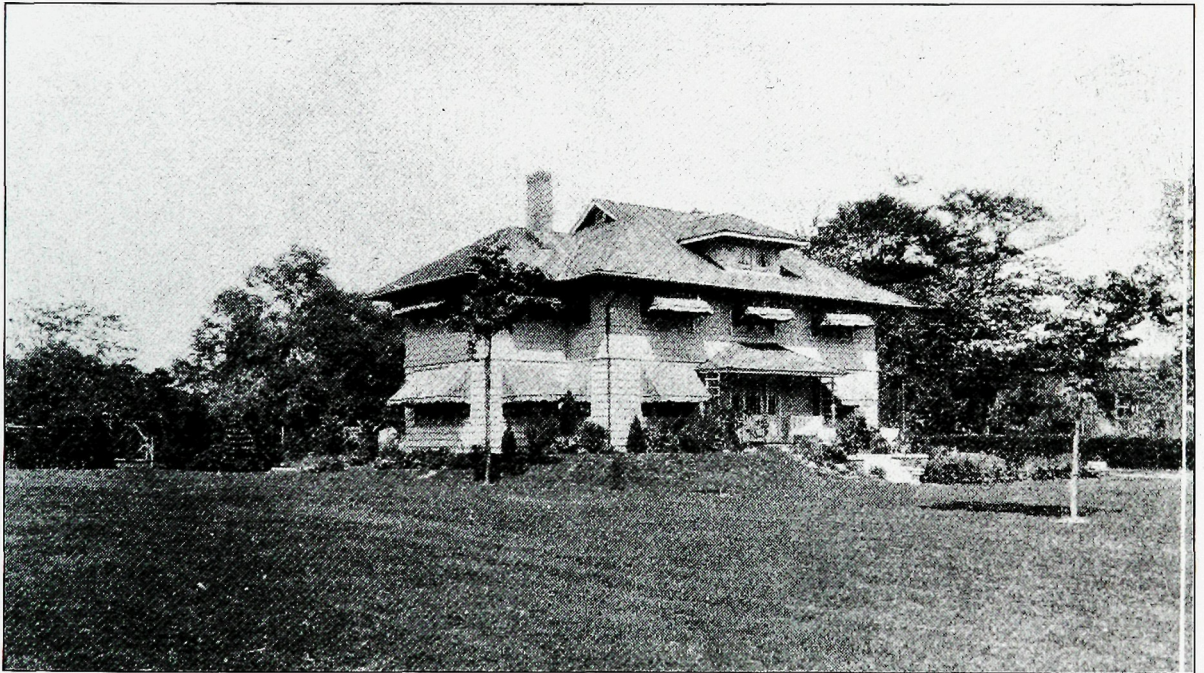


THE WALTER S. FORCE HOUSE. This house, built in 1892, was the residence of the first borough tax collector and, later, of Dr. Ray Thomas Munger, chief surgeon of Muhlenberg Hospital. In 1926, it was owned by Ragner Hasselgren, Inc. This Dutch Colonial Revival house has been renovated by Jim and Barbara Vierschilling into a bed and breakfast. It looks out on the grounds of the railroad station on North Avenue.



THE HAND HOUSE. Located on Martine Avenue, this house represents the Prairie Craftsman style of architecture. The hipped roof is characteristic, lending a stately quality to this c. 1923 home. Edward L. Hand resided here.
