

SCHOOL NEWS

Approximately thirty-nine candidates turned out for the first practice session at the High School field (including nine letter-men - which is truly something) for Coach Remcho to beam about.

After viewing the football aspirants go through two and a half hours of conditioning exercises, the coach declared, "there is plenty of good material available and we ought to give our opponents plenty of trouble!" Remcho feels that this year's team will surpass 1943's squad of fifteen boys who won three and lost four.

Three backfield men who saw plenty of action last year will be available. They include all-state Jim Shreve, ace forward passer and a fine open field runner; Paul Sanguiliano, last year's distant punter; and Dave Winston, who is ranked as one of the finest blocking backs around these parts.

Three first-string guards, Co-Capt. Charles Persson, Galen McGowan and Leigh Thomas, will team with Bob Long and Co-Capt. Mike Sylvester, last year's tackles. From last year's J. V. squad, Jack Todd, Richard Wilson, Tony Tittanigro, Harry Thomas and Robert Graves are counted upon for some heavy duty work.

Remcho is also grooming two backfield units, one a holdover from last year's squad. For the first time in a number of years the Coach feels he will be two deep in all positions.

A fine squad of freshmen and sophomores are out for football and are eager and enthusiastic to grasp the fundamentals. Billy Simon, Clyde Bayver, Roland Ackerman, Billy Mineop, Laurence Zampella are a few who will carry the colors for the Raiders in a year or two.

This year the Raiders have an 8 game schedule; five at home and three away. Metuchen will help dedicate the new athletic field on September 30, while Harrison H. S. will close the season here on Thanksgiving Day.

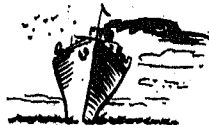

We hope this will be of real value not only for the boys entering the Air Corps but as a peace time occupation for many of the boys in the field of aviation.
