LIEUT. JOSEPH BLOTNER REPORTED HELD BY GERMANS

Lieut. Joseph L. Blotner, AAF Bombardier, who had been reported "missing in action" over Germany on October 15th, is now a prisoner of war of Germany, according to inform-ation received from the International Red Cross by his parents Mr. and Mrs. Joseph L. Blotner Sr., of 410 Union Avenue.

A War Department telegram listing the bombardier missing in action was received by his parents on October 30th. A month later Mr. and Mrs. Blotner received a letter from their son's pal, Lieut. Paul Becker, which shed some light on their son's disappearance.

Lieut.Becker wrote that they both were on the same mission in separate ships when Blotner's plane left the formation because of engine trouble. It was evident that the pilot was going to attempt a landing and the ship was under perfect control. when it left the formation. Lieut. Becker expressed confidence that the local lad was either a prisoner of war or had landed safely in Germany.

A graduate of SPHS, Class of 1941 where he served as editor-in-chief of the Fanscotian, Lieut. Blotner was in his second year at Drew Univ. Madison, Wis., when he joined the Enlisted Reserves.

He received his wings and commission at Kirtland Field, Albuquerque, N. M. last July. He was stationed N. M. last July. at Hunter Field, Savannah, Ga., before going overseas September 15th. ****
