BARDOLF (67th Port Co T.C., APO 795, New York) is stationed at Khorram shahr, Iran, with the Persian Gulf Command, where he has met many boys from this area. Entered the Army Sept. 1942, training at Fort Dix, N. J. and Camp Stoneman, Calif., before going overseas in May 1943. S/Sgt. FRANK BARDOLF is a waist gunner in a B-17 Flying Fortress and has completed more than 50 missions from his base in Italy. He has been awarded the Air Medal with two Oak Leaf Clusters and is authorized to wear the European-African-Middle East Theater ribbon with two campaign stars. Entered the Army January 1942 and trained at Fort Dix, Fort Knox and Camp Campbell, Ky. Was received by the Pope while on a 3-day leave in Rome. Recently married Miss Dorothy Schwartz at Louisville, Ky. Pfc. DANIEL P. BARDOLF (Squad. B., SAAF, Warrensburg, Mo.) is a member of an AAF ground crew. Entered the Army in April 1943 and trained at Fort Dix and Miami before going to Sedalia Field, Mo. Dan's crew-mates, M/Sgt. N.V. Mieth, T/Sgt. J. M. McNeil, Cpl. Dan Cottone and Pfc. THE POZNANSKI BROTHERS, Cpl. Joseph and Cpl. JOHN, are both attached to the 99th Signal Battalion, the former with Co. C, APO 929, San Francisco, the latter with Co. A, APO 324, San Francisco. Joseph and John both trained at Fort Dix, N. J. and at Fort Ord, Calif., before going overseas together in April 1943. They are sons of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Poznanski of 37 Victor Street.

Douglas McKoy, 24, aviation radio man, second class, has received the Purple Heart for injuries received in action in New Guinea in September 1944. Discharged from the Naval Hospital at Key West, Fla., where he was sent for treatment, he has been transferred to the Naval Air Station at Boca Chica, Fla.

The accident in which McKoy was injured occurred when his plane, returning from a bombing mission, crashed while landing at its home base in New Guinea. An explosion, following the crash, severely injured several members of the crew and McKoy suffered eye injuries. He refused a medical discharge and hopes to be reassigned to his work as radio operator.
