Three Republicans Elected to Town Committee

Voters of Scotch Plains elected three Republicans to the Township Committee in the November elections, placing five members on that governing body for the first time since 1878. The new members will be W. Seward Lyon, of Zone 7, Floyd H. Werts, of Zone 3, and Gordon R. Ehrlich, of Zone 4.

Aĺso elected was Tax Collector Joseph Albert, who has held that of-fice for many years. Both the com-mittee candidates and the tax collector were unopposed. Lyon and Werts will serve for three years while Ehrlich was elected for the two-year There was one write-in vote term. for Frank J. Mason for the two-year term and one for Robert Smith for the three-year term. Mason is a Dem-ocrat and Smith is a Republican.

The vote for Seward Lyon was 1068 while Werts received 1062 and Ehrlich 1026. Joe Alber the ticket with 1085. Joe Albert ran shead of All Assembly and Board of Freeholder candidates ran far ahead of their Demogratic opponents:

In the Pre-Election Rally held on Election Day eve, in School One, the local committee candidates impressed all with their sincerity of purpose and many hearers expressed the opinion that the Township would indeed be fortunate in obtaining the services of successful business men such as Lyon, Werts and Ehrlich to conduct its affairs.

\$79.800 QUOTA SET IN BOND DRIVE

Scotch Plains! Victory Loan Drive has opened under the chairmanship of Paul C. Smith, who served as co-chairman of the 7th War Loan Drive. Quota for Scotch Plains has been set at \$79,800, of which \$14,700 has been set for Series E Bonds.

A house-to-house canvass of the entire township will be made by a corps of volunteer workers. Head-quarters for the committee has been set up in the office of MidlinModels in Park Avenue opposite the Post Office.

The war has been won. The drama,
Secretary of the Treasury, Fred M. Vinson says, is gone. It is no longer possible to picture dollars, loaned to the government, as being transformed into planes and ships, tanks and guns for use against foreign enemies.

In one sense, therefore, the Victory Loan campaign now under way presents a more difficult challenge to the American people than any of the seven huge war loans previously oversubscribed.
