SENIOR CLASS HISTORY

In 1980, the incoming students from Park and Terrill merged into the sophomore class of Scotch Plains-Fanwood Hig School. This blending created new friendships that would last throughout our high school careers. After patiently endur ing Sophomore Orientation, the confusion evolved into organization with the election of Kathy Kutcha, Gina Dinizo and Susan Morton as our class officers. We then became "hardened" members of S.P.F.H.S. as it became all too clear tha our lockers were combustible and as we dodged flying food in the cafeteria food fights. Talented members of our class designed an exciting float entitled "Annie", which won the award for the best float in the Homecoming Parade. This was the year that our outstanding class athletes first demonstrated their talents at the high school level.

As Juniors we elected Ray Valasquez, Karyn Kmak, and Shari Somerville as our class officers. For the second year, attistic members of our class created a prize-winning float entitled "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs" at Homecoming 1981. We attended the last Gong Show and a controversy arose because of allegedly unruly crowds. This controversy precipitated a sit-in and an assembly to resolve the tensions caused by the feelings of hostility in the school. The African Relief Drive was held, strongly supported by the Junior Class, and broadcast on major TV networks.
