## MRS. GRUBMAN RETIRES

Irene Grubman retired in December after teaching science in Scotch Plains over two decades.

Science Supervisor Mary Ann Hull has brought him into many new experiences, "from raising chickens to the quiz bowl . . . from giving first aid to a parakeet to watching ferrets in my room."
