
Stand By For NEWS: The Fourth Estate At Spiffy-Hi Is Alive And Relatively Well

With expanded color and coverage, and improved graphics, the 1991 CULMEN may be its most ambitious undertaking ever. At nearly \$50.00 per copy, it was truly the most expensive to date. The 1991 book would be the last of six produced under Mr. Multer's advisorship. Change was the goal of the past six years and the SPFHS yearbook underwent a minor metamorphosis during that time.

Channel 34 News underwent a period of expansion, as well.
